#### **Utrecht Summer School**

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#### Introduction

Welcome to the Utrecht Summer School and welcome to European Cultures & Identities. The aim of this course is to introduce you to Europe, a continent with many different countries that all maintain their own political systems, cultural traditions, and national identities. Yet, the majority of the European countries have, since the second half of the twentieth century, been increasingly engaged in a joint project aimed at political and economic integration in the European Union.

Lecturers from Utrecht University will introduce various European topics in different educational formats: hybrid lectures that can be followed either online or via MS Teams, live and online seminar sessions, an excursion which will also have an online equivalent. The course can be divided into three general themes: 1) The idea of Europe; 2) European Culture and Identity materialized; 3) European Culture and Identity beyond the material. Within each theme there will be two or three lectures, accompanied by seminars, in which lecturers will address one of the following topics: The Idea of Europe (theme 1), Nationalism (theme 1), Heritage (theme 2), Art (theme 2), Science (theme 3) and Colonialism (theme 3).

The course will conclude with three assessments covering all the lectures and reading material. For the first assessment, you will hand in a portfolio consisting the class assignments you have made during the summer school on Tuesday 12 July (10% of your grade). For the second assessment, you will prepare a group presentation about one particular European state or nation, and discuss its relation to the European Union and/or the concept of Europe at large. You will be asked to relate your case study to the lectures and to the reading material, and you will be challenged to formulate your own argument accordingly (40% of your grade). The third assessment will be an examination about the core themes of the course during which your knowledge of the material will be tested (50% of your grade).

In the coming two weeks, we hope to provide you with a solid foundation for understanding the historical developments of European cultures and traditions, and their relationship to conceptions of a European identity in general. You will be taught to critically examine traditional narratives and to understand European history, culture and politics from different angles. We aim to have you enjoy the fruits of academic discussion and to stimulate you in developing your own original argument. We wish you a very pleasant time at Utrecht University and in Utrecht University's digital teaching environment!

There will be two assessments that both test your knowledge and challenge you to formulate your own argument based on the course matter:

Class assignments: 10%
 Group presentation: 40%

Both assessments will take place at the end of week 2 and you need an average grade of at least 5,5 to pass the course.

#### **Attendance and Grading**

Note that full attendance is expected in all lectures, seminar sessions, and excursions. Students who are absent beyond their fault (illness, accident, etc.) should submit a medical certificate to Timo Houtekamer as soon as possible. Make-up assignments are expected for all unexcused absences. Ten percentage points will be subtracted for all uncompensated absences. Students who fail more than two make-up assignments will be dropped from this course.

Your grades will be numerical grades according to the Dutch grading system. Dutch grades range from 0 (very bad) to 10 (excellent). At Utrecht University, a 5,5 is the lowest passing grade, though note that this might be different at other (Dutch) institutions. Also note that grade inflation has not affected the Dutch grading system as much as it has some American institutions. Grades of 9 and higher are rarely given, the most common grades are between 6 and 8. The Utrecht University student registration system (Osiris) that will produce your transcript will round off all grades to whole numerals for 5 and lower, and half numbers for 5.5 and higher. On course work and examinations, however, it is customary to receive a grade that has not been rounded off. Plusses and minuses are sometimes used, and count for one-fourth of a point, for instance: 8- = 7,75. Meaning of numerical grades:

#### **COURSE SUMMARY**

During this course you will be introduced to the rich history and cultural traditions developed in the Netherlands from the Middle Ages to the present day. The question of Dutch identity will be explored by placing the history of the Netherlands and Dutch art in a wider European perspective. This will then lead to exploring traditions of literacy, cosmopolitanism, tolerance, its connections to the wider world, and the challenges that were encountered during periods of war and upheaval.

This course is devoted to two specific themes: History (1) and Art (2)

Theme 1: Dutch Identity and History - We will start with several lectures that will give you insight in distinctive historical periods of Dutch history. Topics that will be discussed include: development of the Netherlands during the Middle Ages, the Dutch religious landscape and the history and culture of the 17<sup>th</sup> century, the so-called 'Golden Age'.

Theme 2: History of Art - Within the historical context of the preceding topics, you will be introduced to the cultural expressions and traditions that support the Dutch in their claim to international fame as a cultural nation. During this part of the course, lecturers will discuss early modern, modern and contemporary art in the Netherlands, touching upon famous artists such as Rembrandt, Vincent van Gogh, Mondrian and many others.

You will experience an intensive two-week programme with lectures and seminar groups during which you are expected to participate in discussions and work on assignments and group presentations. We will also undertake excursions to the Rijksmuseum and the Van Gogh Museum (both in Amsterdam) in order to take a closer look at the artworks and their context.

#### **PROGRAMME**

The course consists of different teaching methods, including lectures, seminars (including museum excursions), self-study, and group work. In general, the day-to-day programme is organized so that there is a range of different, and complementary, activities on each day.

Please note that the course will be interactive, and that you will be encouraged to actively participate in all classes. This includes asking relevant questions and engaging in discussions about the literature and the lectures offered. As the programme will be clear, the course does include a group project, culminating in a final presentation, and an exam.

You will receive more information, and a finalized and more detailed schedule, on the first day of the course.
