The Rev'd. Katherine Grieb, Ph.D. is director of the Center for Anglican Communion Studies at the Virginia Theological Seminary. A renowned commentator and theologian, she is a member of the Inter-Anglican Standing Commission on Unity, Faith, and Order (IASCUFO) and a member of the Theology Committee of the House of Bishops of the Episcopal Church.



The Rev'd. Charlotte Methuen, Ph.D. is professor of Ecclesiastical History at the University of Glasgow. Ordained in the Church of England, she has served as canon theologian at Gloucester Cathedral and at Ripon Cathedral. She is the author of many works, including *Luther and Calvin: Religious Revolutionaries* (2011), and a coeditor of *Translating Christianity* (2017).



The Rev'd Canon Jack McDonald, Ph.D. is canon theologian of the Diocese of Gibraltar in Europe of the Church of England, Chaplain-President of the Central Committee of the Anglican Church in Belgium, and a researcher at the KU Leuven. A historian of religious belief and practice in the era of the French Revolution, he has written extensively on ecumenical relations.



The Right Rev'd. James Tengatenga, Ph.D. is Distinguished Professor of Global Anglicanism and director of the Alternative Clergy Training Program (ACTS) at the School of Theology of the University of the South. He has served the church as bishop of Southern Malawi, chair of the Anglican Consultative Council (ACC) and as a member of the Inter-Anglican Commission for Ecumenical Relations.



Christopher Wells, Ph.D. is Director of Unity, Faith and Order for the Anglican Communion, where he leads and supports the work of the Inter-Anglican Standing Commission on Unity, Faith and Order – the international body that advises provinces, the Secretary General and the Instruments of Communion on ecumenical relations and doctrine. Since 2011, he has served as theological consultant to the Anglican-Roman Catholic Consultation in the U.S. (ARC-USA).



The Rev'd. Michael Rusk is the rector of Emmanuel Church, Geneva, a parish of the Convocation of Episcopal Churches in Europe. Born in Belfast, Northern Ireland, the son of a priest of the Church of Ireland, he was ordained in the Church of England and served in the dioceses of Durham and Leicester. He is the co-author, with Bonnie Evans-Hills, of *Engaging Islam from a Christian Perspective* (2015).



The Most Rev'd. Ian Ernest is the director of the Anglican Centre in Rome and Personal Representative of the Archbishop of Canterbury to the Holy See. From 2006 to 2017 he served as Archbishop and Primate of the Church of the Province of the Indian Ocean. He is a recipient of the Cross of Saint Augustine from the Archbishop of Canterbury (2008) and served as a member of the Design Group for the 2008 Lambeth Conference.
