Concept course programme 2024 - The Making of Europe: Rise of Civilization

In this syllabus you find the course schedule and literature. We would like to ask you to read Christopher Hibbert, *Rome: The Biography of a City*, London: Penguin Books, 1987 (buy online) prior to the course. Each course day focuses on one or more chapters from Hibbert. In preparation for each course day, you are also required to read one or two articles, which are indicated in the programme and will be provided by the course directors.

Lectures take place at the **Centro Congressi Cavour (Via Cavour, 50/a, 00184 Roma)** and excursions are on location in the city. This course has two assignments: (1) a presentation on location on a topic of your choice and (2) a final essay (2,500 words excl. footnotes). You will hear more about these assignments on the first day of the course.
