COURSE SUMMARY

During this course you will be introduced to the rich history and cultural traditions developed in the Netherlands from the Middle Ages to the present day. The question of Dutch identity will be explored by placing the history of the Netherlands and Dutch art in a wider European perspective. This will then lead to exploring traditions of literacy, cosmopolitanism, tolerance, its connections to the wider world, and the challenges that were encountered during periods of war and upheaval.

This course is devoted to two specific themes: Art History and Cultural History

Theme 1: History of Art - Within the historical context of the preceding topics, you will be introduced to the cultural expressions and traditions that support the Dutch in their claim to international fame as a cultural nation. During this part of the course, lecturers will discuss early modern, modern and contemporary art in the Netherlands, touching upon famous artists such as Rembrandt, Vincent van Gogh, Mondrian and many others.

Theme 2: Dutch Identity and History - We will start with several seminars and lectures that will give you insight in distinctive historical periods of Dutch history. Topics that will be discussed include the development of the Netherlands during the Middle Ages, the Dutch religious landscape and the history and culture of the 17th century, the so-called 'Golden Age', and societal changes until the late 20th century.

You will experience an intensive two-week programme with lectures and seminar groups during which you are expected to participate in discussions and work on assignments and group presentations. We will also undertake excursions around the historic cities of Utrecht, Delft and Amsterdam, and visit famous museums such as the Royal Delft Museum, the

Rijksmuseum and the Van Gogh Museum and in order to take a closer look at the artworks and their context.



<u>Utrecht</u>

Utrecht's ancient city centre features many buildings and structures several dating as far back as the High Middle Ages. It has been the religious centre of the Netherlands since the 8th century. It lost the status of prince-bishopric but remains the main religious centre in the country. Utrecht was the most important city in the Netherlands until the Dutch Golden Age when it was surpassed by Amsterdam as the country's cultural centre and most populous city.

Utrecht is host to Utrecht University, the largest university in the Netherlands, as well as several other institutions of higher education. Due to its central position within the country, it is an important transport hub for both rail and road transport. It has the second-highest number of cultural events in the Netherlands, after Amsterdam.
